From the day I married an Air Force fighter pilot in 1979, my goal as a writer began to focus on ways to bring awareness of military subjects into mainstream America. I learned early on that the publishing world likes to categorize subject matter, and they sometimes refer to military themed stories as belonging to a niche market. But there's nothing "niche" about being human. Whether military or civilian, we all have similar hopes, fears, and dreams for those we love and for ourselves.

In my first published novel, *The Final Salute*, set against the backdrop of a fictitious Air Force base in the south, I wrote about how fighter pilots too often die in peacetime training missions while the brass are busy covering up sex scandals. The story revolves around a military family amidst possible wartime deployment. The southern setting and the characters could easily be switched out for any small town in America involving workplace politics. When my youngest son joined the Army after college in 2010, my passion for writing about the military kicked in overtime. My second novel, *Johnnie Come Lately*, deals with the repercussions of a heat-of-the-moment confession, an absent mother, and a son's enlistment during wartime. A war memorial on Main Street in Portion, Texas, takes on a life of its own and becomes a character and not just part of the setting. How many times do Americans pass by a war memorial and really give it a thought? I decided to do something about it by putting a war memorial smack dab in the center of my story.

I continue that theme in the sequel, *Seven Wings to Glory*, which releases from Camel Press, April 2017. After all these long years of our nation fighting the war on terrorism, with nearly 7000 young men and women dead and thousands more maimed from IEDs, I'm driven to explore the issue of military service when only one percent of our nation is willing to step up and defend our freedom and democracy. My challenge and goal has been to write about how the trauma of war can affect generation after generation. I will continue the fight.

During a Creative Writing class at Lamar U., since I was the only veteran in the class, I was asked to write a short story based on my Vietnam experience. Later, an English professor advised me that I should expand the story into a novel. I graduated in 1979, and slowly began writing the novel. In the early 80s, I attended a writers' conference in Austin and presented a draft of the novel. It was not received very well. An agent told me, "I am sorry, but I can't do much with this novel. It is absurd, doesn't make sense, there are no moral characters, and it is too long." I told him that was the point of the novel. The Vietnam

~Getting Into the Spirit~ Recipe for Pumpkin Roll

Ingredients

- 3 large eggs, separated
- 1 cup sugar, divided
- 2/3 cup canned pumpkin
- 3/4 cup all-purpose flour



War was absurd, did not make sense, there was no morality, and it was too long. He then understood and offered to help me with it. But in the mid-80s, there wasn't a market for Vietnam novels.

I kept on writing on the novel, more as of a sort of therapy, as I let out my emotions of the memories of the war. By the time I had finished it, it was over 700 pages of fiction based on some of my experiences and those of others. But I wasn't ready to get it published. I had a demanding civilian job that used up a lot of my free time. Thus, when I retired in 2012, I returned to the novel and began editing and rewriting to make it more presentable. I sent out queries to some publishing houses but most of them either rejected the novel or offered expensive options. With the help of some friends and associates, I decided to self-publish the novel and the first batch of the books was completed in June, 2016.

Al Navarro was drafted into the U.S. Army in 1966 and served three years, including a 1967-1968 Vietnam tour with a MACV Advisory Team in Hoi An, I Corps. Later, he was in the Texas Army National Guard and the U.S. Army Reserve, retiring at the rank of Sergeant Major.

Al graduated from Lamar University, Beaumont, Texas. Al's civilian career consisted mainly with State and Federal agencies, assisting veterans and their families with employment and training opportunities.

- 1 teaspoon baking soda
- 1/2 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- 1/8 teaspoon salt
- **FILLING:**
- 8 ounces cream cheese, softened
- 2 tablespoons butter, softened
- 1 cup confectioners' sugar
- 3/4 teaspoon vanilla extract
- Additional confectioners' sugar, optional

## Directions

1. Line a 15x10x1-in. baking pan with waxed paper; grease the paper and set aside. In a large bowl, beat egg yolks on high speed until thick and lemon-colored. Gradually add 1/2 cup sugar and pumpkin, beating on high until sugar is almost dissolved.

2. In a small bowl, beat egg whites until soft peaks form. Gradually add remaining sugar, beating until stiff peaks form. Fold into egg yolk mixture. Combine the flour, baking soda, cinnamon and salt; gently fold into pumpkin mixture. Spread into prepared pan.

3. Bake at 375° for 12-15 minutes or until cake springs back when lightly touched. Cool for 5 minutes. Turn cake onto a kitchen towel dusted with confectioners' sugar. Gently peel off waxed paper. Roll up cake in the towel jelly-roll style, starting with a short side. Cool completely on a wire rack.

4. In a small bowl, beat the cream cheese, butter, confectioners' sugar and vanilla until smooth. Unroll cake; spread filling evenly to within 1/2 in. of edges. Roll up again. Cover and freeze until firm. May be frozen for up to 3 months. Remove from the freezer 15 minutes before cutting. Dust with confectioners' sugar if desired. Yield: 10 servings.
